Stuff You Should Know

Going Green

Adopting just one of these ideas this summer will make a lasting difference to our world.

Rein in Energy Use

Make a habit of turning off lights not in use. The flip of a switch not only saves energy—and oil, natural gas, or coal mined from the earth—it saves money on electric bills.

Recycle

According to research from Oberlin College, if every American household recycled just one out of ten plastic bottles used, we'd keep 200 million pounds of plastic out of landfills every year.

Think Green Outside

Help keep pesticides and herbicides out of local waterways, where chemicals harm local wildlife and pollute groundwater. Instead, opt for eco-friendly lawn alternatives such as cutting grass higher and leaving grass

clippings on the lawn. (Tall grass crowds out weeds and shades grassroots, and clippings naturally fertilize the ground.) Or use organic fertilizers or compost to keep your lawn healthy.

Buy Local Foods

Buying locally grown foods—apples from a nearby orchard or potatoes from a local farmers' market—helps reduce both fuel consumption and greenhouse gas pollution. While seasonal vegetables are relatively easy to find at local markets, you can also challenge yourself to find local dairy products, meat, and more.

Dear friends in Christ,

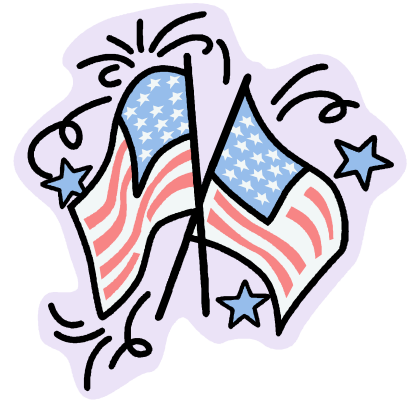

Since the early 1800s various groups have observed a day to display the American flag. Presidents Woodrow Wilson (in 1916) and Calvin Coolidge (in 1927) issued proclamations marking June 14 as National Flag Day. But it wasn't until August 3, 1949 that Congress approved June 14 as a day of national observance. President Harry Truman signed it into law.

The American flag has changed designs more than any other flag in the world. In fact, the United States didn't have a standardized flag until 1912. And even after standardization, the flag changed three more times with the addition of new stars representing new states.

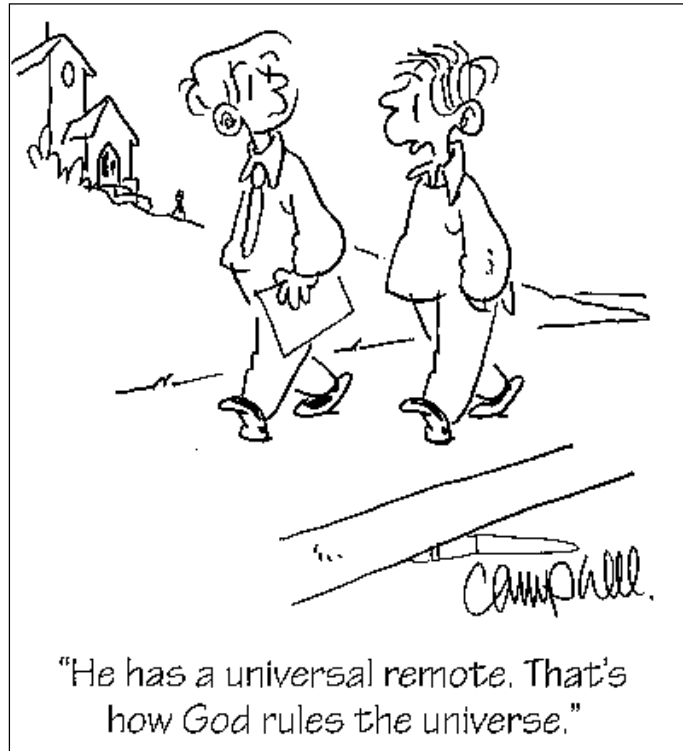
“Decomposing” Takes Time

Jesus, who often escaped to a deserted place with his disciples, knew that decomposition takes time. The making of good, rich, life-giving compost, for example, takes time. “You can’t hurry compost for the same reason you can’t hurry love and you can’t hurry a soufflé,” explains James Gleick, author of *Faster*. “The biochemistry has its own inherent place.” Likewise, grandchildren take time, learning a foreign language takes time, the testing of new drugs takes time, and vacations that truly enable us to rest, relax and recreate take time.

Disciples of Jesus today should recognize the need for the deserted place. It’s a timeless place—a place in which long books can be read, epic movies can be watched, endless prayers can be offered, and deep thoughts can be pondered. It’s a place of Sabbath-keeping and rest, renewal and relaxation, silence and inspiration. It’s a place to be at ease, to become rich and fertile and mature.
